We managed to organize Interbranch in a very short time and a big learning curve!! We have continued in that vein, but are making copious notes along the way and many phone calls and emails seeking advice! All the branches of KZN Pony Club have undergone change this past year. Overview

Our Interbranch was very successful with all our 11 branches participating and 166 riders. Two branches, Noodsberg and Yellowwood Park closed during the early part of 2011, so they were not at Interbranch. It was run at the Durban Shongweni Club from 10 to 15th July. Following Interbranch we sent a survey out to all our members and their families to ask their opinions of Interbranch. We thought it would help to bring costs down by changing it to a 3 day show, but were met with great opposition. We then tried to remove Eventing, the idea being to have it at a different time of the year with the correct eventing dressage tests, but this was also vetoed. People felt they were prepared to pay one amount for everything, and that more separate events would prove too costly. For many riders, Interbranch is the one and only time that they have an opportunity to event.

Our under 10 class, running for the 2nd year, was very well supported. It is really great to see the enthusiasm and the number of riders at this level. All levels competed in 5 disciplines: Dressage, Eventing (not the u10's), Jumping, Equitation and Jumpkhana. Due to Children's Champs and our teams in Ireland, we were not able to offer Eventing at an Open level. This was a cause for concern as the few Open riders we had, had to ride Intermediate level. This certainly skewed our final results and caused upset amongst the competitors. (This had not been our decision).

Each branch was responsible for organizing one of the Disciplines. Some branches worked together. There is such expertise out there amongst the branches, that each discipline was expertly organized! The spirit was high and was not even dampened by the driving rain on the last day during Equitation.

The committee learnt a great deal from this experience and made copious notes as to ways in which the running of Interbranch could be improved upon! We are in the process of creating an Interbranch committee, with people directly responsible for certain things, so as to make the organization more efficient. Unfortunately, I didn't see much of the riding, as I was so busy appeasing unhappy parents. I feel that the emphasis on Team has diminished in importance and it has become more about the individual. We are determined to change this, as Pony Club is essentially about team participation.

Our 2011 Interbranch had 331 entries and cost R107 749.65 to run. KZN PC made a profit of R3015.35. We battled to collect in our monies for Interbranch from the branches, so will set rules in place that if entries are not paid prior to Interbranch, that branch will not be allowed to participate. We also became involved in issues within the branches, ie parents pulling children out the night before the competition started and refusing to pay the entries. We have learnt from this and realise the Branch, not Regional, is directly responsible for sorting it out.

There has been concern that the individual costs of attending Interbranch are too great, so we have been making suggestions that Branches follow the lead that Summerveld have taken in solving this issue very ably through monthly fundraising. We have also brought this matter to the attention of DSC who will look at creating a special Pony Club menu as we feel their food prices are so high.

OTHER REGIONAL EVENTS:

A and B test Camp 17-23 December 2011

During December, Charlotte Houston and Louise Toucher hosted a very successful A and B camp held on Louise's farm near Midmar. They hosted 16 candidates, 15 for the B camp and Megan Marr for the A camp. Two of the girls came from Western Cape. These girls need to be commended on their behaviour and the way in which they fitted into a strange environment so easily. They were real ambassadors for their Region!

This was the first time that Charlotte and Louise have offered this camp, and I have managed to persuade them to make it a regular event, and to open it up to all Regions. Besides the tuition and Seminars, of which the Pony Clubbers had plenty (they each had 2 lessons daily), it is an opportunity for the older Pony Clubbers to meet and interact with each other. The most exciting part for me, as an observer, was to see that the examiners were giving the candidates lessons every day, and thus were able to form very sound opinions about each person's riding ability over a 5 day period.

The B test questions were carefully compiled by Shirley Weatherhead, our Regional Testing Coordinator. She worked closely with Lindsay. Shirley advised Louise and Charlotte from the planning stages as to how the camp and the testing should be run, and the instructors were passed by Troye Kernick, the co-ordinator of the KZN SANEF modules.

We are still compiling the report to request Lotto assistance for all the Seminars that were held.

12 people rode the ridden test - 10 passed (5 with honours) and 2 failed - Karen Minett and her assistant judges all said they were very impressed with the standard of riding.

14 people sat the horse care exams – 7 passed, 4 have only 1 supp (conformation) and 3 failed. Examiners, including Vet and Farrier, were very impressed with the standard of horse care knowledge. Many received honours passes in subjects. The 4 who have the conformation supp. passed in January. This means that 11 of the 14 have their B test horse care by the end of Jan 2012.

Having experienced my first testing situation of this intensity, there are criteria and specific steps that need to be discussed at a forum such as this, and put into place as many unexpected so-called 'grey areas' have arisen:

- 1. What criteria does the candidate need to have fulfilled in order to be a good candidate to pass.
- 2. The logistics of having a camp going directly into a test situation —how do you choose?
- 3. The positive aspect of 'continual assessment' which took place over 5 days, giving the Examiners a true reflection of each candidate's riding ability and their ability to look after their horse. Should this become standard?

We are very proud of the calibre of camp that Charlotte and Louise provided, and we commend them on their diligence and careful planning and energy that went into a camp of this nature. Louise had her home overrun by 16 teenagers, for a week! Charlotte never saw her family for a week! Notes have been taken on how to "do it better next year", ironing out all the 'first time' issues. The exciting part is that these 2 ladies are prepared to do this annually!

KZN PONY CLUB TRIP TO IRELAND – 10TH JULY TO 25TH JULY 2011.

11 pony clubbers and 4 adults left a cold Johannesburg for a very wet and cold Irish summer. During the 1st week the group was accommodated in self-catering cottages. This was great, as many of the riders were acquainted, but did not know one another very well, so they were able to build up a good team spirit. The weather turned sunny and warm. This week was spent sight-seeing and trying out horses which seemed to be plentiful. Iveagh Pony Club parents would pull up with their trucks with horses for the KZN riders to try out most afternoons, they were fantastic. On Sunday 17th Suzie held a Derby at her property so that the KZN riders could get a chance to ride the chosen horses before the big event. A course had to be built for the Derby so the riders had the opportunity to assist with course building and moving big solid jumps. Despite some complaints, the job got done. Although the Derby Day was delayed a few hours due to heavy rain, the show went on in the pouring rain. Many of the Iveagh Pony Club members turned up for this show and KZN Pony Club team took 1st place.

During the 2nd week the KZN riders were hosted out to Iveagh Pony Club homes which was a fantastic experience for all to see how the other half live without grooms, domestic workers and labourers on the farms. The Pony Clubbers assisted with all these duties, as well as riding their selected horses and also doing other activities like having fun. On the Tuesday we took a train ride to Belfast where we had a bus tour of Belfast. It was very interesting to see all the religious politics painted over the town walls, the dock where the Titanic was built and many other sites. On Thursday afternoon the riders were taken to walk the cross-country and show-jumping courses. The crosscountry course was very basic and quite short but considering that all 3-phases were been ridden in one day, this was a good option for the horses. On the Friday, with the sun shining, many horse trucks arrived at the show, where about 180 Pony Clubbers participated. What we all found amazing was that in between classes the horses were loaded into the truck or horse box and had to stand there until the next class. Most of our riders started out with a good Dressage Test with Keith Toucher taking the Trophy for the 'Best Dressage score' of the day. The Intermediate Team - 100cm consisting of Keith Toucher, Liam Duffy, Patrick Dillon and Bronwyn Smith took 3rd place which was fantastic seeing as they were riding strange horses. Even though the other teams did not get placed, this was an experience that was well worth being part of.

The last two days were filled with plenty individual activities and collecting all the riders together for the long flight home. They might have been tired but they were all very happy and full of life-time memories of a wonderful experience!
